# Incidental COVID-19 infection linked to higher ICU mortality

New research published in the Medical Journal of Australia has shown that the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) continues to impact mortality rates in intensive care units (ICUs), despite widespread vaccinations and improved treatments for COVID-19. The research used data from the Australian and New Zealand Intensive Care Society (ANZICS) adult patient database to compare the in-hospital mortality and ICU length of stay for people admitted to Australian and New Zealand ICUs during 2022–23 with COVID-19 pneumonitis, incidental or exacerbating SARS-CoV-2 infections, or without SARS-CoV-2 infections.
