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WHO issues 'superbug' warning

TGA issues safety alert for Garcinia gummi-gutta in medicines

An ingredient thought to help with weight loss and embedded in a range of medicines and herbal supplements could pose serious liver injury risks, Australia's medicines watchdog has warned. The Therapeutic Goods Administration issued a new safety alert for Garcinia gummi-gutta and hydroxycitric acid on Thursday, warning the ingredient, which comes from the Garcinia fruit rind, is linked to an increasing number of liver injuries.
