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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Sunday Age (page 1) reports a workforce shortage across the healthcare sector means aged care providers are competing for nurses, with providers being urged to improve incentives for nurses to help fulfill new 40 minute clinical care per resident requirements in the proposed aged care act. The federal government has spent \$11.3 billion on improving wages in the sector, with Aged Care Minister Anika Wells saying that "this significantly improved pay for 250,000 workers and was the biggest pay rise for the sector, ever".
