EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Weekend Australian (page 9) reports that the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons has labeled the ongoing national IV fluids shortage as "a serious threat to healthcare services across Australia", calling for a nationally coordinated strategy for the future procurement of vital medicines. Health Minister Mark Butler said "The TGA is aware that jurisdictions are alerting staff of the situation and instructing all staff to use IV stock judiciously. However, decisions on service prioritisation of available IV fluid stock are all matters managed at the state and territory level."
- The Saturday Age (page 1) reports that the secretary of Victoria's Health Workers Union, Diana Asmar, will face court after the Fair Work Commission filed civil proceedings alleging that she received over \$100,000 in questionable reimbursements and personally orchestrated a \$2.7 million cash-back transaction scheme for non-existent printing services.
- The Herald Sun (page 1) reports that the list of critical medical fluids impacted by a national shortage has grown to 25, prompting the Victorian Department of Health to reissue a directive for health services to conserve supplies and reduce dependence on IV fluids. Recommended strategies included encouraging women in labour and pre-surgery patients to drink more water.
- <u>The Adelaide Advertiser (page 1)</u> reports that RACGP SA chairwoman Dr Sian Goodson has raised concerns that the state government's new payroll tax has resulted in patients being

double billed at GP clinics, stating: "It is patients who will bear the brunt (of the payroll tax)".

- <u>The Hobart Mercury (page 1)</u> reports that senior staff at the Royal Hobart Hospital emergency department believe a planned upgrade to the hospital's emergency department is not fit for purpose and won't meet current or future needs after the Department of Health reduced funding and the number of points of care from 121 to 113.
- <u>The Saturday Paper (page 11)</u> reports that various research projects and clinical trials are underway in Australia to determine the causes and potential treatments for long Covid, which has cost the Australian economy an estimated \$9.6 billion since the pandemic.
