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### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- <u>The Australian</u> (page 1) reports that the left-wing minor Greens party have proposed a series of taxes to fund new policies, including the expansion of Medicare to include dental coverage.
- The Australian (page 4) reports that Minister of Health Mark Butler has announced that the federal government has succeeded in securing 22 million bags of IV fluids over the next six months, a quantity that is expected to exceed projected demand. The Department of Health has also confirmed that Baxter, Australia's sole onshore IV fluid manufacturer, will expand its operations so that local production of IV bags can be increased.
- The Sydney Morning Herald (page 1) reports that residential aged care operators are warning that more homes may be closed than built within the next five years if current federal rules are not changed, leaving the sector short of 21,200 beds. Also reported by: The Age

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# Illawarra overdose deaths rise amid opioid addiction treatment shortage

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# Emergency Services Minister Stephen Dawson rejects calls for rescue helicopter base in Geraldton after crash

It comes as negotiations between the not-for-profit hospitals and these health funds have reached an impasse. Yim says the policyholders are the ones who are stuck in the middle and are potentially facing high out-of-pocket expenses after November.
