- The Australian (page 4) reports that the findings of an investigation into Australia's systems for accessing new medicines and technologies has found that implementing reforms and establishing an independent body for systematic change could reduce waiting times for new treatments by up to 16 months. The Health Technology Assessment report, commissioned in 2022, was handed to Minister of Health Mark Butler on Tuesday, after which the government promised to form an implementation group to review and carry out its recommendations.
- <u>The Daily Telegraph</u> (page 4) reports that a rapid test created by SureScreen Australia, capable of detecting substances such as GHB, benzodiazepines and ketamines in spiked beverages within minutes, will be available for purchase online in Australia starting from next week.

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## Australia to ban life insurance companies from discriminating based on genetic testing results
