- The Australian (page 4) reports that the upcoming Health of the Nation report has found that 31 per cent of GPs avoid using the My Health Record system, prompting calls from the Royal Australian College of GPs (RACGP) for the Federal government to improve its usability.
- The Illawarra Mercury (page 7) reports that Australia's free shingles vaccine program will now be made available to anyone over 18 who is immunocompromised, with Health Minister Mark Butler saying that the federal government would spend more than \$57 million in expanding the vaccine program.
- The New Daily reports that Federal National Leader David Littleproud has floated the possibility of a Coalition government reducing the tax on beer in order to alleviate cost of living pressures, with Health and Aged Care Minister Mark Butler rejecting the idea and saying that government would instead prioritise other cost-cutting measures.
