- <u>The Adelaide Advertiser</u> (page 1) reports that South Australian Liberal frontbencher Ben Hood's attempt to introduce new legislation forcing mothers to be legally required to deliver their babies after 27 weeks is set to fall short.
- <u>The Daily Telegraph</u> (page 3) reports that pharmacists across the nation are set to be retrained to treat patients for a range of conditions after new data revealed approximately 40 per cent of Australians are waiting up to three weeks to consult a GP.
- <u>The Sydney Morning Herald</u> (page 12) reports that NSW nurses and midwives went on a 24hour strike yesterday following the NSW Nurses and Midwives' Association's rejection of a 10.5 per cent rise over three years by the Minns government.
- The Sydney Morning Herald (page 12) reports that a coronial inquest has heard yesterday that a 62-year-old man who died from cardiac arrest at Albury Wodonga Private Hospital in July 2019, was moved out of a high dependency ward three days before his death, despite concerns being raised by nurses about his heart.
