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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Adelaide Advertiser (page 9) reports that Australians are switching to illegal nicotine products following the national ban on vapes, and experts are concerned children have the potential to become addicted to nicotine. Health Minister Mark Butler said the government was deeply concerned about the increasing profile of nicotine pouches.
- <u>The Hobart Mercury</u> (page 9) reports that the federal government has committed \$120 million in funding for the Northern Heart Centre, to be established at the Launceston General Hospital.
- ABC News Online reports that a coroner has said the death of an 85-year-old Queensland aged care resident who was left alone in temperatures that reached 30 degrees was a "tragedy that could have been prevented, with a forensic pathologist ruling heatstroke as the cause of death.
- ABC News Online reports that new data from the Federal Department of Health has revealed
 a doubling in the number of psychiatric medication prescriptions given to children and
 teenagers over the last 10 years, with Harriet Hiscock, a paediatrician and clinical researcher at
 the Murdoch Children's Research Institute, saying it is because "it's becoming more socially
 acceptable".

- <u>The Daily Telegraph</u> (page 15) reports that the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) is set to reveal that more than 70 per cent of patients treated by general practitioners have listed mental health as the reason for their visit.
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 7) reports that the Queensland Nurses and Midwives Union is expected to lobby the newly elected Queensland state government for a 3.8 per cent annual wage increase, according to sources from The Australian newspaper.
- ABC News Online reports that South Australian Health Minister Chris Picton has criticised a
 proposed change to the state's abortion laws, which would require women seeking to terminate
 a pregnancy after 28 weeks to undergo induced birth, as an "extreme right-wing culture war
 bill".
- <u>The Guardian</u> reports that the NSW government is set to introduce a trial starting from Saturday, which will make it easier for women aged between 18-49 to access the oral contraceptive pill.
