### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The Saturday Paper (page 1) reports FOI documents have revealed emails from Salesforce inviting Department of Health and Aged Care members to hospitality events held by the company, which holds several contracts with various government departments. A spokesperson for the health department said "Acceptance of offers of hospitality to department officials are evaluated for compliance with the department's Conflict of Interest and Gifts and Benefits policies".
- The Adelaide Advertiser (page 1) reports an unnamed source has alleged prisoners are
  exacerbating hospital ramping by exaggerating or fabricating illnesses to receive treatment,
  where they are admitted immediately, cutting in front of waiting ambulances, according to the
  source.
- The Hobart Mercury (page 1) reports the Tasmanian health department has tripled its spending on agency and locum staff since last year, spending \$180 million on temporary staff for 2023-24.
- <u>The Ballarat Courier</u> (page 1) reports regional health services in Victoria are cutting staff through redundancies as part of new budgets that Victorian Health Minister Mary-Anne Thomas has said will focus on removing "back of house" roles.

- <u>The Courier Mail</u> (page 3) reports the National Asthma Council Australia has issued a warning
  to asthma and hay fever sufferers ahead of severe thunderstorms coupled with north-easterly
  winds that are expected to trigger an early pollen season.
- <u>The Canberra Times</u> (page 5) reports a new national commission for First Nations children will launch next year, with its focus including targets of reducing the number of children in child protection and combatting high Indigenous suicide rates.
- <u>The Adelaide Advertiser</u> (page 7) reports sale plans revealed through FOI requests suggest shutting down the ICU and replacing it with a high dependency unit after changes in Bupa policy meant the unit was losing \$2.4 million a year.
- The Herald Sun (page 9) reports the death of a child with a nut allergy at Holmesglen Private Hospital is the subject of an inquiry into whether appropriate care was given to the child, with the attending paramedic saying he informed hospital staff of the child's wheezing in his patient handover.
- The Weekend Australian (page 11) reports the cardiovascular medication Vazkepa has been listed on the PBS, with Health Minister Mark Butler saying, "Vazkepa is a life changing drug and now we're making it cheaper for more Australians ... Without this listing Australians would have to pay around \$1800 per year".
