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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Sunday Age</u> (page 1) reports illegal tobacco is believed to be behind a \$25 billion reduction in tobacco excise since 2019, prompting calls to reduce taxes on tobacco and allow retail sale of vapes with similar taxes imposed on them. Health Minister Mark Butler has pointed out similar taxes on vapes in New York have failed to raise significant revenue. *Also reported by:* <u>Sun Herald</u>
- The Sunday Mail Brisbane (page 3) reports smoking among young Australians has been increasing since the end of the Covid-19 pandemic, with 13 per cent of people aged above 16 reported to be smoking daily. Also reported by: <u>Sunday Mail Adelaide</u>, <u>Sunday Herald Sun</u>
- The Sunday Canberra Times (page 4) reports ACT Labor has pledged to increase access to free period products if re-elected, with products set to be available at sports pavilions, libraries and other government facilities following the legislation of free period products in 2023.
- The Sunday Age (page 5) reports FOI documents have revealed the Victorian Department of Health has failed to pay almost half of all invoices below \$3 million within the required 10 day threshold, despite a 25 per cent improvement in on-time payments since the end of the pandemic.

- The Sunday Tasmanian (page 6) reports the Council of the Ageing Tasmania is calling for societal shifts in attitudes towards an increasingly ageing population, saying issues such as transportation, infrastructure and housing should be addressed to enable more dignified options for elderly Australians who don't want to be viewed as infirm based simply on age.

Bullsbrook residents living off bottled water due to PFAS contamination to get new water supply by March 2026

There's been mixed reaction from residents of the semi-rural suburb of Bullsbrook, north of Perth, to an announcement that they will finally get access to safe drinking water from early 2026. The suburb has been engulfed in an almost decade-long contamination saga which rendered the water at a number of houses and businesses undrinkable.

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
