#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The Sunday Age (page 1) reports the TGA is taking major medical cannabis prescription service Montu to court over its advertising practices and running an illegal referral scheme, which Montu denies, with the TGA warning repeated contraventions of laws around medical cannabis promotion can lead to public harm.
- The Sunday Mail Brisbane (page 1) reports the LNP has claimed Queensland Labor deliberately delayed the release of a four-year review into Redland Hospital by 39 days as part of a "culture of cover up" within Queensland Health. Queensland Health Minister Shannon Fentiman has refuted the claims, saying the 1000-page document was made available to the public at the same time the ministers received it from Queensland Health.
- <u>The Sunday Territorian</u> (page 3) reports a two-day training course for Aboriginal Health Practitioner students has been held by Careflight and the Batchelor Institute, with spokespeople for the organisations saying the training will help improve remote healthcare in the Northern Territory.
- The Sunday Age (page 4) reports the first vaccinations to wildlife will begin shortly as part of a \$100 million package to fight against the intrusion of H5N1 avian flu into Australia's biodiversity, with vaccinations for livestock workers also available despite a low chance of human infection.

• <u>The Sunday Mail Adelaide</u> (page 5) reports a doctor who is responsible for half the baby deliveries at a regional Queensland hospital has been restricted from having any contact with female patients or practicing telehealth by AHPRA.

# Most common US pesticide may affect brain development similarly to nicotine

Industry research reviewed by independent scientists show that exposure to the nation's most common pesticides, neonicotinoids, may affect developing brains the same way as nicotine, including by significantly shrinking brain tissue and neuron loss. Exposure could be linked to long-term health effects like ADHD, slower auditory reflexes, reduced motor skills, behavioral problems and delayed sexual maturation in males, the new review found.
