- <u>The Australian</u> (page 1) reports lower socio-economic areas are recording higher rates of heart attacks, cancer and chronic diseases while wealthier suburbs have recorded reductions, according to a report from Victoria University, leading to calls for more preventable health measures to combat rising inequality.

Health risks higher in poorer areas

Rates of heart attack, cancer, diabetes and other chronic diseases are decreasing in the nation's wealthiest postcodes but escalating in disadvantaged areas, a major report has found. Research and testing has now shown the group of 14,000 chemicals, which take a long time to break down, can be found in the environment.

Australian neurologists are urging a ban on the herbicide paraquat, citing its links to Parkinson's disease. Dr David Blacker, a WA neurologist who was diagnosed with Parkinson's in 2018, suspects his condition could be tied to childhood exposure to paraquat. While agriculture groups defend paraquat's role in food production, Dr Blacker and over 40 specialists note its broader public health and environmental risks. The Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority is reviewing the herbicide, though both the regulator and manufacturer deny a proven causal link to Parkinson's.
