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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Sun Herald (page 1) reports NSW Health Minister Ryan Park has announced \$200 million in funding to address overdue surgery waitlists that have been exacerbated by industrial action, with Mr Park saying "We are determined to ensure everyone who needs surgery in NSW gets it as quickly as possible ... this investment will help address this setback and ensure we are continuing to see everyone as quickly as we can".

State's surgery waitlist doubles in three months
