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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Australian</u> (page 5) reports that new aged care legislation is set to pass parliament in a \$5.6 billion overhaul of the sector. Peak bodies welcomed the expected passing of the bill, however, the Aged and Community Care Providers Association warned the transition would provide "incredibly hard" administrative challenges for the sector.
- The <u>Courier Mail</u> (Page 10) reports that a \$1.37 billion increase to the cost of six major health projects will be mostly paid for by taxpayers. The six projects affected are stage 2 of the Ipswich Hospital and Logan Hospital expansions, the expansions of Princess Alexandra Hospital, QEII Hospital, Hervey Bay Hospital and the Cairns Hospital upgrade.
- The <u>Courier Mail</u> (Page 12) reports that life-saving surgery for women who need preventive
 mastectomies due to an inherited high risk of cancer are waiting up to five years. On Thursday

"The rapid increase in ambulance ramping has resulted in higher risks and more frequent adverse outcomes including death for patients," the report read.

• The Guardian reports that a new study by the Royal Women's hospital in Melbourne has found a lack of CPR mannikins with breast overlays is contributing to women being less likely to receive chest compressions from bystanders. "Our study is the first of its kind to name this as a gender and human rights issue linking this to business human rights and the commercial determinants of health," study lead Dr Rebecca Szabo said.
