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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Courier Mail (page 1) reports a doctor hired to a senior position to a Queensland hospital is facing allegations of stalking, with the same doctor resigning from a position at Queensland Health last year following allegations of sexual assault. AHPRA has declined to answer whether they have received complaints regarding the doctor.
- The Australian Financial Review (page 1) reports Ramsay Health Care shareholders are calling on the private health service to sell offshore assets in order to focus on its local hospitals amid ongoing pressures for the private industry and as nurses at 17 of Ramsay's 76 hospitals are planning a 24-hour strike over a pay dispute.
- The Courier Mail (page 4) reports the AMAQ is calling on the Queensland LNP to make flu vaccinations free for all Queenslanders as Health Minister Tim Nicholls says he wants to consider the efficiency of a three-year trial before deciding whether to continue or axe the program.
- The Courier Mail (page 4) reports pill testing in Queensland will close from early next year as
 the LNP has announced it will no longer provide funding, with AMAQ president Nick Yim urging
 the government to reconsider as he says many people are using the sites to test for fake

- The Canberra Times (page 6) reports demand on Canberra's public hospital system has
 increased by almost 20 per cent in the past two years, with Canberra Health Services chief
 executive Dave Peffer saying slow growth of the workforce means the system will face
 challenges as demand increases.
- The Australian (page 7) reports an artificial heart has been successfully implanted in an Australian patient for the first time, with inventor Dr Daniel Timms saying "being able to bring Australia along this journey ... and be part of the first clinical trials is immensely important to me, and something that I set out to do from the very beginning". A clinical trial has been funded by the Medical Research Future Fund to follow this feasibility study.
- The Guardian reports valproate medications with a high risk of causing birth defects have been
 given to over 100 pregnant women in Australia, according to FOI documents that show the TGA
 was advised by the Advisory Committee on Medicines that changes to prescribing requirements
 for the drugs were not necessary earlier this year.

 curriculum for nursing students at Homesglen Institute following data from the Victorian Skills
