EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The <u>Launceston Examiner</u> (Page 1) reports that a divisive motion that recognises alleged DNA contamination in COVID-19 vaccines has been approved by a Tasmanian local council as "a potential public health issue".
- The <u>Courier Mail</u> (Page 4) reports that a bill banning social media for individuals under 16 has
 received backing from health experts via a letter signed by over 120 paediatricians,
 psychiatrists, GPs, psychologists, dietitians, social workers, mental health nurses, research and
 other specialists.
- The <u>Daily Advertiser</u> (Page 6) reports that according to a survey of National Aboriginal and
 Torres Strait Islander Health conducted by the Australian Bureau of Statistics, almost half of
 Indigenous people have a chronic health condition. "The increase was driven by [a jump] in the
 proportion of people aged two years and over with mental and behavioural conditions up from
 24 per cent in 2018- 19 to 29 per cent in 2022-23," a bureau spokesperson said.
- The <u>Courier Mail</u> (Page 7) reports that research published in the Australian and New Zealand Journal of Psychiatry has found an 85 per cent spike in deliberate self-poisoning among girls aged between 5 to 14. "These findings suggest the pandemic lockdowns severely and disproportionately impacted the mental health of female adolescents," said senior author Nicholas Buckley from the University of Sydney's School of Pharmacy.

- The <u>Sydney Morning Herald</u> reports that within the past month alone more than 150 cases of whooping cough have been reported within Queensland with staff at Brisbane public hospitals reporting up to 28 times the usual amount of cases this time of year.
- The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> reports that Transport for NSW air-quality tests revealed that silica dust
 exposure during the Sydney Metro project exceeded workplace exposure standards in 34 per
 cent of cases, with workers unprotected in 8 per cent of instances. A spokesperson for Minister
 Sophie Cotsis says that SafeWork NSW will meet unions to address concerns about tunnel air
 quality and the risks posed to workers.
