Whooping cough epidemic the worst on record

Australia is experiencing its worst whooping cough epidemic on record, with more than 41,000 confirmed cases so far this year driven by school children, as childhood vaccination rates dip. Data from the National Notifiable Disease Surveillance System show a major spike in whooping cough (also known as pertussis) among children aged 10 to 14, accounting for almost 40 per cent of the 41,013 cases recorded in 2024, which surpasses the previous record in 2011 of 38,748.
