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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Weekend Australian (page 1) reports the former chair of Mental Health Australia Matt Berriman has said the current state of Australia's mental health system is "one of Australia's greatest health failings in generations" following his resignation from the peak advocacy group six months ago, citing a lack of engagement from the government. Federal Health Minister Mark Butler has said the recent data from an ANU report detailing the lack of support for the severely mentally ill is "a stain upon the nation".
- The Weekend Australian (page 2) reports Health Minister Mark Butler has reached an agreement with Sanofi to ensure the eczema medication Dupixent remains on the PBS after unexpected uptake of the medication led Sanofi to consider removing the drug from the scheme. "Since it was first listed on the PBS in 2021, Dupixent has improved the quality of life for thousands of Australians with severe eczema ... The demand has been higher than expected, and we've worked hard to make sure that it remains affordable" Mr Butler said.
- The Weekend Australian (page 2) reports changes to aged care pricing schemes will be
 delayed for 12 months following discussions between the federal government and industry
 stakeholders. "This decision has been made based on feedback from the sector and the
 opposition about the need to avoid service disruption and ensure continuity of care for older
 people," Aged Care Minister Anika Wells said.
