## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- <u>The Sunday Telegraph</u> (page 1) reports the Retirement Living Council has warned of
  impending aged care accommodation and healthcare shortages in NSW as the average age of
  residents has risen above 40 for the first time. A spokesperson for Aged Care Minister Anika
  Wells said a recently passed \$4.3 billion investment into aged care will add 300,000 home care
  packages in the next decade.
- The Sun Herald (page 1) reports residents in Sydney's north-west say a new hospital at Rouse Hill to be completed by 2029 should have a birthing suite, while NSW health authorities say birthing services won't be required until the late 2030s, with the cost of adding them when required already considered in modelling.
- <u>The Sunday Times</u> (page 1) reports the general manager at Road Trauma Support WA is calling for more funding as he says a lack of mental health practitioners trained to deal with children under 13 is forcing them to refer children to other services.

- <u>The Sunday Age</u> (page 1) reports more safety precautions for sailors in the Sydney to Hobart
  yacht race need to be implemented, according to the owner of the winning boat, who says the
  deaths of two sailors on Friday should foster a conversation about safety reforms.
- <u>The Sunday Tasmanian</u> (page 5) reports parents who believe they are teaching their children responsible drinking by supplying them with alcohol when they are underage are contributing to risky drinking, according to a study by Flinders University.
