

- The Herald Sun (page 1) reports experts are warning a new fashion trend involving showing off sunburnt tan lines on social media could lead to an increase in melanomas for young people, with unsafe sun safety practices being promoted by influencers online. Also reported by:

- The Newcastle Herald (page 1) reports a redacted report released by NSW Health shows that urgency categories for surgical patients at John Hunter Hospital were routinely downgraded to avoid breaches of recommended waiting times, with senior clinicians and surgeons claiming NSW Health pressured them to do so in order to gain more favourable breach rates.
- <u>ABC Online</u> reports the NSW Cancer Institute is urging women to undergo their two-yearly breast screening as it was revealed 48.4 of women in NSW are overdue for a check.
- <u>The Sydney Morning Herald</u> (page 7) reports claims that 60-day prescribing would cause over 600 pharmacies to close have been proven wrong, with only 22 closing and 87 new pharmacies

approved since the changes came in. "The Albanese government has had a laser-like focus on delivering cheaper medicines. Our hard-fought reforms are delivering cheaper medicines to millions of Australians, already saving them more than \$1 billion in out-of-pocket costs.", Health Minister Mark Butler said.
