EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Weekend Australian</u> (page 1) reports US research shows flossing your teeth at least once a week reduces the risk of stroke by a fifth, with the dental habit reducing the build-up of bacteria and plaque, which are linked to blood clots and heart disease. The Australian Institute of Health and Welfare reports there were an estimated 40,700 strokes in Australia in 2021.
- <u>The Saturday Age (page 1)</u> reports the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency is investigating an Australian compounding pharmacy for selling colic medicine containing the toxic ingredient belladonna and the Therapeutic Goods Administration is considering classifying belladonna as a schedule four drug, which would then require a doctor to prescribe it.
