#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- <u>The Australian</u> (Page 1) reports that as mass resignations take effect in hospitals across NSW the state government has moved to active crisis footing on mental health, asking for expressions of interest from private hospitals to care for public patients.
- The <u>Sydney Morning Herald</u> (Page 1) reports that the Royal College of Psychiatrists has been accused of contributing to the NSW's mental health crisis by NSW Premier Chris Minns. NSW Health has declined to disclose how many psychiatrists will resign this week.
- The <u>Herald Sun</u> (Page 5) reports that Victorians trailing overseas are being urged to get vaccinated against measles as new cases have been linked to travel in Vietnam. Two weeks ago Victoria's acting chief health officer Dr Evelyn Wong reported a rise in measles infections across southeast Melbourne.
- The Australian (Page 8) reports that the Australian Medical Association has said that the federal government must form a committee dedicated to preventing medicine shortages. "Medicine shortages and other disruptions have a profound effect on the community and inadequate communication can result in additional costs for patients, for whom there is often little transparency or forewarning," AMA president Danielle McMullen said.

The <u>Herald Sun</u> (Page 13) reports that from February 1 additional restrictions on the sale of
paracetamol will be implemented with packets containing fewer tablets, both in pharmacies and
in other places where paracetamol is sold. The Therapeutic Goods Administration is
encouraging retailers to restrict sales to a single pack at a time.
