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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The Southern Highlands Express (page 1) reports a carer has been charged with multiple counts of fraud relating to an 89-year-old nursing home resident, as the Australian Human Rights Commission notes financial elder abuse is the third most common form of elder abuse behind psychological abuse and neglect.
- The Sydney Morning Herald (online) reports the Water Services Association of Australia is
  calling for the entire family of per- and polyfluoralkyl chemicals to be banned in Australian
  consumer goods, telling a senate inquiry that it was necessary for public health and to avoid the
  cost of treating contaminated drinking water.
- The Australian (online) reports the World Health Organisation reports alcohol caused 2.6 million deaths in 2019, accounting for 4.7 per cent of all fatalities, while the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare estimated there were 1,667 alcohol-related deaths nationwide in 2023, with 31 per cent of the adult population engaging in "risk-level" drinking.
- <u>7 Rockhampton</u> reports the Albanese government is rolling out 61 walk-in mental health centres around the country, with venues in Rockhampton and Gladstone the latest to open, as Assistant Minister for Mental Health, Emma McBride, notes the centres are breaking down barriers to care.

- The ABC (online) reports Australia is 2,400 doctors short of requirements as regional and remote towns engage in a bidding war for GPs, with Health Minister Mark Butler saying the federal government is committed to having small towns retain access to primary healthcare, though the Department of Health predicts the shortfall for GPs will increase to 8,900 by 2048.
- The Daily Mail (online) reports the World Cancer Research Fund says a combination of maintaining a slim waist and regularly exercising is the most effective at reducing the risk of cancer, with a study of 315,000 British people finding not keeping to either guideline increased the risk of cancer by 15 per cent.

# Governments slammed for handling of PFAS contamination in Western Sydney, Blue Mountains

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# Forever chemicals being found 'literally everywhere'

Australia needs to prevent the introduction of more "forever chemicals" amid warnings it is becoming increasingly difficult to deal with the contaminants already in the environment.
