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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

<u>The Herald Sun</u> (page 9) reports a Monash University study of 1.8 million pregnant mothers found gestational diabetes has increased by 70 per cent nationally in the past six years, which the researchers attribute to more obese mums, older mums and changing migration patterns.

<u>The Northern Territory News</u> (page 5) reports the NT government has expanded its free meningococcal B vaccination scheme to all children aged from six weeks to two years and to teens aged 14-19.

<u>The Sydney Morning Herald</u> (online) reports doctors are warning the fractured psychiatric system poses an unacceptable risk to public safety as their patients face the prospect of being placed in the criminal justice system rather than hospitalised after experiencing a mental health crisis.

<u>The Daily Telegraph</u> (online) reports the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency cancelled the licences of 24 health professionals in Victoria last year, with many of them committing sexual offences or abusing drugs.

<u>The ABC Online</u> reports the Albanese government has yet to respond to 63 senate inquiries, including one on women's reproductive health, which Health Minister Mark Butler and Assistant Health Minister Ged Kearney claimed they were waiting on the report before making decisions, but have yet to respond more than a year after receiving it.

<u>Channel 9</u> reports a national study has found 80 per cent of girls say they have been approached by online groomers before the age of 15, while 7.6 per cent of boys report they had been targeted before the age of 18.

<u>The Medical Republic</u> (online) reports NSW Health is offering locum contracts to the 43 psychiatrists who have already resigned from the public health system and is also in discussions with the federal Department of Health and Aged Care on a redesign of the mental health system to provide more holistic care.
