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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- ABC Online reports there are calls for greater regulation and clear national oversight of the
 massage industry from victims of abusive practitioners as they say a lack of oversight means
 banned massage therapists can work in separate jurisdictions and state industry bodies are in
 charge of industry guidelines such as police check requirements. A review into the National
 Registration and Accreditation Scheme is looking into expanding the scheme to include other
 health professionals, with Mark Butler saying in September that "All patients should feel safe
 when dealing with health professionals".
- The Sunday Mail Adelaide (page 4) reports physically fit people with cancer are 31 26 per cent less likely to die from any cause, according to researchers from Edith Cowan University and the University of Queensland.
- The Sunday Telegraph (page 5) reports three women have been hospitalised with suspected botulism after receiving anti-wrinkle injections from a home cosmetic clinic in Western Sydney, with NSW Health issuing a public alert on Friday and launching a probe in conjunction with NSW Police and the Health Care Complaints Commission. - <u>The Sun Herald</u> (page 6) reports lengthy hospital stays caused by post-Covid symptoms is placing strain on the health system and driving up costs, according to researchers and private

- ABC Online reports locals in Jurien Bay in Western Australia have called on the RACGP to
 reinstate accreditation for the town's only female doctor under the Fellowship Support Program
 after her accreditation was removed, forcing her to relocate and leaving the surrounding area
 with two GPs, which locals say will cause delays and remove the option of seeing a female
 doctor for women.
- <u>ABC Online</u> reports cases of mosquito-borne disease in Queensland have reached their
 highest point in four years, according to Queensland Health, with the CSIRO saying climate
 change is exacerbating the issue with an increase in severe weather events and hotter weather.
