EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian (page 6) reports that Premier David Crisafulli has said on Sunday that Queensland plans to go ahead with its planned review into gender dysphoria treatments despite warnings from Health Minister Mark Butler not to continue during the national review.
- The <u>Sydney Morning Herald (page 5)</u> reports that NSW patients awaiting beds in aged care facilities stay at hospitals an estimated 42 days longer than what is necessary, and comes as 455 patients await discharge to aged-care facilities. A spokesperson for Health Minister Mark Butler and Aged Care Minister Anika Wells said that the federal government had invested \$200 million into aiding NSW patients to move into aged-care facilities.
- The Australian (page 15) reports that the Australian Private Hospitals Association has said that its members will not be contributing to the hospital data collection framework, saying that the data is sensitive and that there has not been a short-term measure raised to address shortfalls in the private hospital sector.
- The <u>Herald Sun (page 1)</u> reports that the Australian Medical Association will pitch today an overhaul of the Medicare rebate system which would raise the bulk-billing rates for doctors, expand the types of items covered, and inject an extra \$4.5 billion into the system.

- The Australian (page 6) reports that Headspace chief executive Jason Trethowan has called
 for changes to the Medicare funding model for his organisation, instead calling for dedicated
 funding for long-term staff to help reduce the organisation's backlog and increase its clinical
 capacity.
