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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Age</u> (page 1) reports that a number of Melbourne's eastern suburbs have received perfect scores on a new Environmental Quality Health Index developed by researchers at Monash University's School of Public Health and Preventive Medicine, which aims to assist policymakers in determining which areas might need additional investment to address environmental issues such as heatwaves.
- <u>The Canberra Times</u> (page 1) reports that Canberra's Calvary John James Hospital has submitted a development application for a \$500 million refurbishment that will provide two new operating theatres, but reduce bed numbers.
- The Daily Advertiser (page 1) reports that nurses and midwives in the Wagga region have criticised a NSW government decision to expand a program deploying healthcare workers to fill short-term placements in regional, rural and remote areas, with industry leaders noting that the funding invested in the program could instead be directed towards a pay rise for permanent staff.
- The Newcastle Herald (page 1) reports that a seven year-old child suffering anaphylaxis was
 treated by a pharmacist at the direction of a Triple Zero officer after a local GP clinic turned her
 away twice, stating that they were too busy to take on new patients.
