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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The <u>Herald Sun</u> (Page 1) reports that a parliamentary inquiry has heard that several lives have been lost with more being put at risk as the result of a toxic culture of harassment, poor management, burnout and a resourcing crisis in Ambulance Victoria.

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More evidence that menopause before age 45 years is linked with CVD

Australian researchers report that women with premature or early menopause are at a higher risk for cardiovascular disease (CVD) when compared with women who experience menopause at a later age and that a healthy lifestyle can mitigate this risk. Their study, published in Heart, included 46,238 women (mean age 62.1 years) from the Sax Institute's 45 and Up Study and compared the risk of CVD in women with premature (<40 years) or early (40 to 44 years) menopause with the risk in those with menopause between 50 and 52 years.

ACCC denies MAIF extension, effectiveness "undermined"

The ACCC has rejected the Infant Nutrition Council's (INC) application to continue the infant formula marketing agreement for another five years citing concerns over its effectiveness and impact on competition. The Marketing in Australia of Infant Formula: Manufacturers and Importers Agreement (MAIF Agreement) and associated guidelines was developed to restrict the advertising and promotion of infant formula.

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
