- The Australian Financial Review (page 3) reports that two nurses at Sydney's Bankstown Hospital were stood down after a video surfaced online showing them claiming they would refuse to treat Israeli patients. Health Minister Mark Butler said that the nurses' comments "run against every single principle in our healthcare system".
- <u>ABC News</u> (online) reports that Labor has been accused of misleading voters and reviving the
 "Mediscare" campaign after it shared an edited video of Peter Dutton in which he appears to
 claim he would end free healthcare. An email sent by Health and Aged Care Minister Mark
 Butler's office featured a GIF of Mr Dutton saying that Medicare "will not survive in the long
 term."
- The Australian Financial Review (page 4) reports that Treasury has revealed that the government's decision to increase the tobacco excise has led to a decline in tax revenue due to a surge in black market sales, along with other factors including higher rates of quitting and increased vape usage.
- <u>The Hobart Mercury</u> (page 3) reports that a new survey shows one in three Tasmanians aged 25-44 want to reduce their alcohol consumption, citing negative impacts on their bodies and mental health.
