EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Age (page 1)</u> reports a new anti-drug code has been proposed by the AFL, with increased testing and greater penalties part of the suggested reforms.
- <u>The Launceston Examiner</u> (page 1) reports the Tasmanian Department of Health secretary has refuted claims that \$10,000 worth of medicine at Launceston General Hospital was destroyed last week due to insufficient air conditioning.
- <u>The Weekend Australian</u> (page 3) reports principals and teachers have reported significant decreases in behavioural problems and suspensions for vaping since bans on smartphones and vaping were instated. Health Minister Mark Butler said that "This data shows the Albanese government's vaping reforms are working to prevent a new generation from becoming addicted to nicotine".
- <u>The Saturday Age</u> (page 3) reports parents and staff have raised concerns that the Colorectal and Pelvic Reconstruction Service at Melbourne's Royal Children's Hospital has been closed without notifying parents or patients, with a spokesperson for the hospital declining to answer whether the unit was still operational.
- <u>The Canberra Times</u> (page 5) reports the Department of Health and Aged Care is looking to overhaul how it manages fraud cases after the previous system was found to be outdated and

led to failures in the management and tracking of cases, according to a report from the ANAO.

- <u>The Adelaide Advertiser</u> (page 5) reports \$3 million in funding from the National Health and Medical Research Council has been granted towards the development of a single vaccine for meningococcal and gonorrhoea.
- <u>ABC Online</u> reports a Northern Territory coroner has recommended mental health beds at Royal Darwin Hospital be doubled after finding a shortage of beds was among the factors that contributed to the death of Tiwi woman Pukumani Alimankinni in 2021.
- The Sydney Morning Herald (page 8) reports a shortage of public psychiatrists in NSW has led to delays of up to a week for the assessment of involuntary admissions, with staff at Cumberland Hospital saying the delays are leading to distressed patients with increased instances of violence against staff, while NSW Health Secretary Susan Pearce said the government is working on contingency plans to move patients to private hospitals and acquire locum staff to fill the shortages.
- <u>The Hobart Mercury</u> (page 9) reports research from the Pharmacy Guild of Australia has revealed 20 per cent of Tasmanians are struggling to pay for medicines due to cost of living pressures. Federal Health Minister Mark Butler said the Labor government is working towards cheaper medicines, saying "The Albanese Labor government has lowered the maximum co-pay on prescriptions, slashed the amount pensioners and concession card holders pay for their medicine in a year by 25 per cent, [and] introduced the landmark 60-day prescriptions ... ensuring medicines stay cheaper"
