EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Australian</u> (Page 2) reports that the federal government has pushed through \$135 million in digital health grants that will give patients more choices for free mental health services. The grant will go towards organisations previously funded by the Commonwealth.

Wegovy gets TGA approval for CVD

The Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has approved Wegovy 2.4mg (semaglutide) to be used as a complementary therapy for reducing major adverse cardiovascular events, such as cardiovascular death, non-fatal myocardial infarction (heart attack), or non-fatal stroke. The approval follows findings from an international study involving more than 17,000 participants across 41 countries, including Australia, which showed that Wegovy reduced cardiovascular events by 20% in people with pre-existing heart disease who were overweight or obese but did not have diabetes.
