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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The <u>Sydney Morning Herald (page 3)</u> reports that Opposition Leader Peter Dutton announced that the Coalition would match the ALP's \$8.5 billion investment into Medicare if they are elected at the next federal election. Health Minister Mark Butler said: "Remember them saying that months before Dutton tried to abolish bulk-billing and cut \$50 billion from our public hospitals? You bet. He'll say he loves Medicare! He'll protect Medicare. But he doesn't. He won't. Medicare is not in this man's DNA."
- The <u>Daily Telegraph (page 5)</u> reports that up to 17 per cent of non-concession card holders in November said that they were unable to pay for a prescribed medication, a 50 per cent increase from the 11 per cent reported in April 2022. Health Minister Mark Butler said that the government's medication reforms helped save \$1.2 billion in out-of-pocket costs since 2022.
- The <u>Australian Financial Review (page 7)</u> reports that the AMA and RACGP presidents said that the ALP's \$8.5 billion Medicare pledge would affect low-income areas more than high-income areas and that doctors may rush consultations to capitalise on the increased incentives. Health Minister Mark Butler said that the Coalition's claims that the bulk-billing rate was higher during their time in government was a result of inflated data from Covid-19.
