#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- <u>The Canberra Times</u> (page 1) reports Health Minister Mark Butler has warned Australians should be "pretty sceptical about the opposition's announcement yesterday" after Peter Dutton said he would match Labor's historical investment into Medicare, a reversal on his position as health minister in Tony Abbott's cabinet when he froze Medicare rebates.
- The Australian (page 1) reports AHPRA has decided not to impose any punishment on Melbourne obstetrician Miranda Robinson after she was accused of making racially motivated comments towards a midwife with a Jewish husband, with AHPRA saying Ms Robinson had "demonstrated her commitment to uphold the professional standards with respect to appropriate conduct on social media".
- The Hobart Mercury (page 1) reports Private Healthcare Australia has called for a new funding model for private maternity services following an announcement by Healthscope that they would be closing maternity wards in Tasmania and the Northern Territory.
- The Toowoomba Chronicle (page 2) reports the Queensland Opposition has warned the state government is going back on their promise of making no cuts to health after a whistleblower warned nurse-led clinics are facing reductions in hours and cuts to staff months after they were opened.

- The Adelaide Advertiser (page 3) reports the SA Civil and Administrative Tribunal has
  rebuked a doctor after she was hired on a locum contract at Port Pirie Regional Health Service
  and then left after seeing one patient, allegedly saying "this place should not be a hospital".
- The Cairns Post (page 4) reports missing clinician statements relating to the death of a baby at
  Atherton Hospital last year have been provided to the Northern Coroner, eight months after they
  were requested, with the Coroner saying an expert review of all the materials would be ordered
  once they were received.
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 5) reports some GPs have said they would still privately bill some patients after Labor's \$8.5 billion investment into Medicare, claiming the costs of running a practice are still too high to provide bulk-billing to all patients.
- ABC Online reports Queensland Health has defended the outcomes of a review into the death of a man who overdosed on prescription medication and alcohol four hours after being discharged from a mental health admission, with the death ruled an accidental overdose rather than a suicide, which his parents say has left them outraged. A spokesperson for Queensland Health said the hospital followed best practice guidelines in changing the review type to one that is not shared with the state's Health Ombudsman.
- ABC Online reports leaked documents have revealed WA liberal candidate Dr Thomas Brough
  has been referred to the State Administrative Tribunal by the Medical Board of Australia
  following homophobic remarks he made last year. A spokesperson for AHPRA said they could
  not comment on matters until they are on the public record.
- The Age (page 8) reports the Perinatal Anxiety and Depression Australia (PANDA) agency has
  released mental health resources aimed at helping non-English speaking mothers understand
  perinatal depression after current literature was found to be too Westernised to be easily
  understood for some from culturally diverse backgrounds.
