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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Australian</u> (page 1) reports that private health insurance premiums in Australia will rise by an average of 3.73 per cent from April 1, impacting 15 million Australians. Health Minister Mark Butler said that the change represented a "better deal for Australians" after lengthy negotiations with insurers.
