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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Age</u> (page 1) reports that the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists has warned that a surge in "reassurance" ultrasounds offered by private clinics are putting unborn babies at risk, potentially leading to stillbirths, late-term abortions or incorrect diagnoses. *Also reported by: <u>Sydney Morning Herald</u>*
- <u>The Australian Financial Review</u> (page 1) reports that there are concerns that Healthscope could be split up and unprofitable hospitals closed, as international hedge funds vie for controlling stakes in the troubled hospital operator. Health Minister Mark Butler has declined to comment on the future of the company, but has said that the process is being monitored, with a focus on optimising outcomes for Australian patients.
- <u>The Daily Telegraph</u> (page 1) reports that NSW Health budget allocation figures for local health districts for the current financial year have revealed that residents of Western Sydney have been allocated \$2087 in per-capita funding, or \$1134 less per head than residents of the Sydney local health district, prompting criticism from medical staff who have pointing to the funding disparity as a cause of bed block and short-staffing.
- <u>The Courier Mail</u> (page 1) reports that Queensland Health's director-general has warned that the department's budget is being stretched dangerously thin, with repairs and replacements for

critical hospital infrastructure such as the main lifts in Townsville Hospital being delayed in order to prioritise higher-risk assets. *Also reported by: <u>Townsville Bulletin</u>, <u>Cairns Post</u>*

- <u>The Age</u> (page 2) reports that the new head of Sport Integrity Australia will target cocaine use among athletes, as well as highlighting the need to restore trust in the anti-doping organisation WADA, which includes Sports Minister Anika Wells on its executive board. *Also reported by:* <u>Sydney Morning Herald</u>
- <u>ABC Online</u> reports that Health Minister Mark Butler has launched an urgent investigation into alleged price gouging by private health funds, after HCF made use of a regulatory loophole known as "product phoenixing" to raise its premiums by 35 per cent.
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 3) reports that a \$4.9 million government-funded trial will investigate a new drug designed to reduce the risk of developing brain and kidney disease when using heart-lung machines after heart surgery.
- <u>ABC Online</u> reports that Victoria's elective surgery waitlist grew by 9.4 per cent from June to December, reaching 62,878 patients. Experts said the official numbers don't include a "hidden waitlist" of patients awaiting placement, with Victoria's chief surgical advisor Ben Thompson saying they are working to improve its visibility.
- **ABC Online** reports that nurses and other healthcare staff at NSW hospitals are paying up to \$35 per day for parking while they remain on waitlists to access staff carparks, following a change to pandemic-era policies which provided free staff parking.
