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'LSD, MDMA': Party drugs may have helped survivors of October 7 attack, study claims

MDMA and other party drugs may have helped festivalgoers who survived Hamas' horrific October 7 attack, a new study suggests. [...] As of July 1, 2023, authorised psychiatrists in Australia can access MDMA for treating PTSD and psilocybin for treatment-resistant depression (TRD), though under strict controls. According to the TGA, the psychiatrist must be an authorised prescriber and requires permission from a human research ethics committee to prescribe certain medications.

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
