EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Hobart Mercury</u> (page 3) leads coverage reporting Health Minister Mark Butler is injecting another \$156.7m into enforcement measures against the black-market tobacco trade, with the aim of seizing dealers' cash to restrict the operation of the illegal \$5 billion business.
- The Daily Telegraph (online) leads coverage reporting the future of private maternity units is under threat, with 18 facilities closing in the past seven years. The figures include the imminent closures in Hobart and Darwin, amid reports private maternity units may in the future only be viable in metropolitan cities on the eastern seaboard.
- The Australian (online) reports a Melbourne hospital is calling for clinics to lead the charge on youth mental health reform as there are moves to bridge the gap between state and federal health systems. Mental Health Assistant Minister Emma McBride says the Albanese government has invested more than \$300m this financial year to strengthen and expand headspace.
- The Australian Financial Review reports Victorians are most upset at their treatment by
 government during COVID-19, with only one in two rating the performance as "good" compared
 to a national average of 66 per cent. The report by the Australian Human Rights Commission
 warned of disproportionate effects on the Victorian community from tough restrictions, including

a lack of compassion for those with dying family members and the harsh rules imposed on residents of Melbourne's public housing towers.

- <u>The Hobart Mercury</u> (page 14) leads coverage reporting the Public Health Association of Australia is calling on the federal government to establish a national Centre for Disease Control to co-ordinate the country's response to future health emergencies. The government has committed to establishing the body by January next year, with Health Minister, Mark Butler, announcing last October that \$251.7m had been set aside for the project.
- The Australian Financial Review (page 14) reports Healthscope is considering selling itself after reaching a deal with creditors to defer interest payments for several months. Australia's second largest hospital operator is seeking room to find a long-term solution to its trading issues, which sees the company with debts of \$1.6 billion.
