EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Weekend Australian</u> (page 1) reports that childhood vaccination rates have declined significantly since the Covid-19 pandemic, with the rate for one-year-olds falling below the crucial 90 per cent threshold in 53 regions. Health Minister Mark Butler warned that Australia was falling "well below herd immunity levels" for measles and whooping cough in particular.
- <u>The Daily Telegraph</u> (page 3) reports that barely 25 per cent of children aged 6 months to five years old received flu vaccines in 2024, contributing to a record case number of 364,956.
- <u>The Weekend Australian</u> (page 5) reports that NSW Health Minister Ryan Park has requested a parliamentary inquiry into the quality of health services at Northern Beaches Hospital following the death of a two-year-old boy who received care at the facility.
- <u>The Courier Mail</u> (page 4) reports that a Queensland woman has expressed relief after being told her breast biopsy results were mistakenly swapped with another patient, although she criticised the Queensland government for "putting health workers in untenable positions".
- <u>The Courier Mail (page 12)</u> reports that a groundbreaking medical inhaler developed in Brisbane could offer faster, needle-free care for patients suffering anaphylaxis, although the device could be acquired by foreign investors without additional local funding.

- <u>The Canberra Times</u> (page 1) reports that Canberra Health Services will work with WorkSafe ACT to assess risks and improve safety for health staff providing at-home care after two medical professionals were assaulted by patients.
