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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Herald Sun (online) reports domestic medical manufacturing is increasing on the back of support from the National Reconstruction Fund and Medical Research Future Fund as the country moves to reduce its reliance on global supply chains, with Health Minister Mark Butler noting the COVID pandemic highlighted the need to produce the latest vaccines in Australia.
- The Australian (page 1) leads coverage reporting NSW public hospital doctors will strike for three days next week as they continue to fight for a 30 per cent pay rise and improved conditions, while the NSW Government has offered a three per cent rise.
- The Daily Telegraph (online) reports 28 per cent of public school students in NSW have been
 identified as having a disability, driven by a rise in diagnoses of autism and social and
 emotional disabilities and leading to calls for more tailored support and funding in the education
 system.
- **SBS** reports a new COVID variant now accounts for 20 per cent of reported cases in NSW with changes to the genetic structure of the LP.8.1 version believed to enable it to spread more easily, as Australia records almost 45,000 COVID cases to date this year.
- <u>Channel 7</u> leads widespread coverage reporting a trial of a concussion app has shown it can detect concussion among athletes with 100 per cent accuracy by analysing their eye

movement, with hopes the app will soon form part of the concussion-testing protocols for AFL and NRL players.

- The Herald Sun (page 5) leads News Corp coverage reporting an international study of 280,000 people has found a shingles vaccine may decrease the risk of dementia by 20 per cent, adding to evidence linking herpes virus infections such as shingles with a higher risk of developing dementia.
- The Canberra Times (online) leads coverage reporting the AMA is calling for changes to laws around voluntary assisted dying to enable doctors to provide services via telehealth, a move which the peak medical body believes would benefit people living in regional and remote areas and those who may not have easy access to in-person consultations.

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RPA hospital closes HIV psychiatry clinic with 200 patients after staff resignations

The resignation of psychiatrists from Sydney's Royal Prince Alfred hospital has led to the closure of a HIV psychiatry clinic with 200 patients, as well as a loss of specialist psychiatrist services for patients in the pain clinic and the most unwell eating disorder patients.
