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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- **[The Australian Financial Review](#)** (Online) reports Health Minister Mark Butler says Australia will not negotiate with the US administration over the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme as President Donald Trump prepares to announce a new tariff on pharmaceuticals, a move that would threaten \$1.6 billion in Australian drug exports.
- **[The Australian](#)** (page 9) reports renowned Australian stroke researcher Ben Freedman is calling for GPs to include a 30-second pulse check for atrial fibrillation when checking for high blood pressure, saying the move could help improve diagnoses for people liable to suffer strokes, heart failure and dementia, after his research found that 70 per cent of people with atrial fibrillation also suffer from hypertension.
- **[SBS](#)** reports Health Minister Mark Butler says the Federal Government's promise of an additional \$1 billion for mental health services will include two new mental health services in remote Indigenous communities, noting he hopes Headspace will be able to team up with Aboriginal medical services to deliver the program.
- **[The Australian](#)** (Online) reports an international study by Monash University has found people living in flood-prone areas are over-represented in hospitalisation for diabetes, cardiovascular conditions and cancer for up to seven months after a disaster, with the authors noting health professionals should raise awareness of the increased hospitalisation demands after floods to improve disaster response strategies and health system resilience.

- **The Herald Sun** (page 12) reports a University of Queensland study has found the cost of tobacco is disproportionately affecting poorer households, with occupants spending 6.3 per cent of their disposable income on tobacco compared to just 2.7 per cent of people in more affluent areas, which they say demonstrates the complex health and social equity challenges of using high taxation to control tobacco consumption.
- **Newcastle Herald** (page 12) reports a loophole has led public hospitals to create aged and disabled "transition units" and classify the occupants as residents in a move that enables the hospitals to charge patients a proportion of their aged care payments or NDIS funding, though neither the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission or the NDIS Quality and Safeguards Commission has jurisdiction.

Floods raise cancer, diabetes hospitalisations, pointing to post-Alfred health risks

An international study has shown people living in flood-prone regions spend longer in hospital, are more prone to serious medical issues and shoulder a disproportionate amount of the chronic disease burden. A study by Monash University, published in Nature Water, found that for up to seven months after a disaster, hospitalisations for unrelated health conditions rose an average 26 per cent.

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Tai chi, yoga and meditation may help lower high blood pressure 'in short term'

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Diabetes underestimated
