#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The Sun Herald (page 1) reports the dismissal of women's health issues by health practitioners
  has led to a number being misdiagnosed with mental illness and even admitted to mental health
  wards after being accused of imagining their symptoms, according to growing reports of
  medical misogyny that include women being admitted after their partner accused them of
  mental illness following domestic disputes. Also reported by: Sunday Age
- <u>The Sunday Telegraph</u> (page 1) reports a rise in telehealth prescriptions for weight-loss injections has led to calls from medical groups to regulate the industry following a lack of due diligence in checking medical history or consulting with patients' GPs, with doctors warning of potentially fatal side effects if incorrectly prescribed. *Also reported by:* <u>Sunday Mail Brisbane</u>, <u>Sunday Mail Adelaide</u>, <u>Sunday Tasmanian</u>
- The Sun Herald (page 1) reports the Coalition has claimed Labor is misleading voters over advertisements and social media posts from Assistant Minister for Rural and Regional Health Emma McBride warning that Peter Dutton will cut funding for almost 90 urgent care clinics.
- The Sunday Mail Brisbane (page 1) reports the use of performance and image enhancing drugs by women due to the pressures of fitness culture and competitive sports has risen significantly, according to recent data, with the AMA and TGA warning of health risks associated with illicit and often counterfeit injectibles.

- The Sunday Mail Adelaide reports South Australian Police Commissioner Grant Stevens has
  called for a review into the Mental Health Act to determine when police need to attend mental
  health incidents following increased "police ramping" where police are delayed attending
  patients awaiting emergency care.
- <u>The Sunday Tasmanian</u> (page 5) reports Healthscope has refused to release any details of the sale of St Helen's Private Hospital outside confirming the sale has been finalised, citing confidentiality reasons.
- The Sunday Mail Brisbane (page 5) reports Gold Coast Mayor Tom Tate is pushing to hold Olympic rowing events in Hinze Dam instead of the Fitzroy River, having met with rowing representatives and committing to building permanent rowing facilities and grandstands to accommodate the events if selected.
- The Sun Herald (page 6) reports workers in major tunnel-building projects across Australia are being exposed to unsafe levels of silica dust, according to research from the University of Sydney that found over 10 per cent of workers across three projects in Brisbane will likely develop silicosis.
- ABC Online reports rates of common STIs such as syphilis, gonorrhoea and chlamydia have
  risen significantly in the last decade, according to data from UNSW's Kirby Institute, with
  doctors calling for more public health messaging to raise awareness around sexual safety and
  the importance of regular testing.

#### Risk of silicosis for one in 10 tunnel workers

Concerns are mounting about the health implications for thousands of workers employed on the nation's multibillion-dollar tunnelling projects after new research found more than 10 per cent of workers on three major projects would develop deadly lung disease. The University of Sydney research, published in Annals of Work Exposures and Health this month, estimated up to 300 of 2042 workers across three major transport projects in Brisbane the M7 Clem Jones Tunnel, Airport Link and Legacy Way would develop silicosis because of exposures to silica dust in their lifetime.
