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## Could GPs earn \$400k a year?

The Federal Government claims GPs who offer universal bulk billing will earn more than \$400,000 a year under proposed changes to Medicare bulk billing rebates. While that figure may be about four times the average Australian wage, the AMA(WA) and the founder of a network of Perth GP clinics say it's not as simple as that. # Bacteria colorectal cancer link

A groundbreaking new study suggests that a gut-dwelling bacteria may be behind a surge in early-onset colorectal cancer cases. The potential culprit? Colibactin, a toxin produced by certain strains of E. coli that thrive in the colon and rectum. "We believe this exposure occurs very early in life likely during the first decade when children are infected," Dr. Ludmil Alexandrov, senior study author at the

University of California San Diego, told The New York Post. Once thought of as a disease that strikes later in life, colorectal cancer is on the rise among young people.

University of Michigan researchers found a single dose of baloxavir which is sold in Australia as Xofluza can both treat flu symptoms and slow the spread of the virus. The study found the rate of flu transmission among those who took baloxavir was 9.5 per cent, compared to 13.4 per cent for the placebo group, working out to a 29 per cent reduction in the virus' spread.
