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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Herald Sun</u> (page 1) reports that the IVF industry is facing criticism over the lack of transparency after a rise in "identification and traceability issues", however the Fertility Society of Australia and New Zealand is not disclosing the clinics involved. Health Minister Mark Butler said, if re-elected, IVF regulation would be on the agenda. *Also reported by: The Daily Telegraph, The Courier Mail, The Mercury*
- The Canberra Times (page 1) reports that Health Minister Mark Butler said the Coalition's proposed federal public service cuts could lead to entire departments "disappearing", like the Australian Centre for Disease Control, saying "they then pretend that this is not going to have an impact on the health of Australians."
- The Australian (page 5) leads coverage reporting that an inquest into the Bondi Junction Westfield attack heard Joel Cauchi was "floridly psychotic". Mr Cauchi was diagnosed with schizophrenia at 14 and was on medication until late 2019, when he withdrew from the healthcare system. - <u>The Courier Mail</u> (page 16) reports the TGA has expanded approval of the respiratory syncytial virus vaccine AREXVY to include Australians aged 50 to 59 with chronic health or respiratory conditions, as 9,266 cases of RSV have been reported in Queensland this year.
- <u>Australian Financial Review</u> (page 1) reports that medical centre network ForHealth, backed by BGH Capital, has secured tenders to operate a third of Labor's urgent care clinics and will benefit from the \$8.5 billion in Medicare incentives aimed at reducing out-of-pocket fees for patients.
- The Daily Telegraph (online) reports that Australian Institute of Health and Welfare data showed an increase in births among women aged 40 and up, rising from 4.1 per cent in 2010 to 4.9 per cent in 2022, while mothers under 20 decreased from 3.8 per cent to 1.6 per cent in the same period.
