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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Sunday Age (page 1)</u> reports Victorian Premier Jacinta Allan has revealed her struggles with endometriosis, and the time it took to diagnose the illness, as the AIHW estimates over a million Australians suffer from the chronic disease but many say they are ignored as they face medical misogyny, with the Victorian Government set to release a report into the health system's handling of women's pain.
- <u>The Sunday Tasmanian (page 1)</u> reports Calvary Lenah Valley Hospital is hiring additional staff and expanding its maternity ward to prepare for delivering an extra 600 babies a year following the closure of Healthscope-run maternity services at Hobart Private Hospital, with \$6 million in federal funding enabling the upgrades.
- <u>The Sunday Telegraph (page 5)</u> reports a number of health experts have called for patients on weight-loss drugs like Ozempic to receive regular check-ups amid patients reporting hepatitis, while the TGA has received five accounts of hepatitis or drug-induced liver damage linked to the use of semaglutide weight-loss injectables.
- <u>The Sunday Times (page 5)</u> reports the West Australian Government has extended its free RSV vaccination program for young children and infants amid an increase in flu, Covid and RSV cases across the country.
