EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The <u>Saturday Paper</u> (page 6) reports the number of NDIS funding application contested by the agency doubled last year to 1.1 per cent, treatment that has left independent reviewers of the appeals process "appalled".
- The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> (page 23) reports researchers at Victoria's Wesfarmers Centre of Vaccines and Infectious Diseases have found a combination meningococcal vaccine covering all five strains to be "highly effective", opening the door for it to be introduced in Australia, though the MenABCWY vaccine is already approved in the US for those aged 10-25.
- The **Daily Telegraph** (page 34) reports Australians are being urged to check their blood pressure during May as part of the Stroke Foundation's campaign to help save lives. Check can be performed at pharmacies or your GP.
- The <u>Illawarra Mercury</u> (page 5) reports the percentage of 18-24-year-olds in Wollongong being prescribed drugs for ADHD more than doubled in two years, according to data from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, as an increased awareness of the condition leads to more people seeking diagnoses.
- <u>ABC Online</u> reports the NSW Nurses and Midwives' Association says Illawarra aged care provider IRT is the only one withholding pay increases approved by the Fair Work Commission

in March. IRT chief executive officer Patrick Reid says the company introduced pay rises in January to ensure it met the rates it expected to come into effect in March, with all increases from the FWC decision already passed on.

<u>The Mandarin</u> reports neither side of politics wants to discuss the role of bureaucrats in health, despite a 2023 review of the Federal Department of Health and Aged Care's capability finding officials needed to develop system reform capabilities. NSW EPA approves remediation plan for Lake Munmorah site cleanup

The NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) has approved a Voluntary Management Proposal for the former Lake Munmorah Power Station site as part of the first phase of a complex remediation process. Part of the site was declared significantly contaminated in April last year due to PFAS and petroleum hydrocarbon pollution, stemming from the historical operation of the coal-fired power station and past use of firefighting foams.

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
