#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The Medical Republic (online) reports that the Labor's health team, including Health Minister Mark Butler, has retained its seats in the lower house. Mr Butler said in a radio interview that he would like to continue leading the department, but acknowledged that the decision is up to the caucus.
- The Australian (page 3) reports that a review by St Vincent's Hospital Sydney found issues in the genetic cancer testing of more than 500 patients conducted by former senior physician Allan Spigelman from April 2022 to June 2023, including cases where patients received wrong results. - <u>The Sydney Morning Herald</u> (page 1) reports that PFAS, at levels above proposed safety limits, were detected in a Leura reservoir that supplements the tap water supply, prompting Sydney Water to drain two drinking water reservoirs.
- The Courier Mail (page 2) reports that Queensland Premier David Crisafulli did not confirm whether the government would withhold back pay from nurses and midwives if they took industrial action over the state's wage offer.
