A spokeswoman for the Fertility Society of Australia and New Zealand said consultation on NMSS was done 10 years ago, and "amid a falling Australian birthrate and an evolving ethical landscape, it may be time to revisit the discussion."
- The Mercury (page 1) reports that healthcare workers in Tasmania are urging the state government to invest on nurses and midwives, and ensure safe staffing levels and workforce planning to tackle burnout in hospitals. Health Minister Jacquie Petrusma said nearly 3,000 professionals have been recruited since last year.
- The Advertiser (online) US President Donald Trump will sign an executive order to slash American drug prices by up to 80 per cent. The move raised concerns that it could affect Australia's PBS, with the Federal Government possibly forced to raise non-concession medication prices despite freezing pensioner and concession costs until 2029.
