- The Herald Sun (page 1) reports a diet developed by Monash University researchers has been found to reduce the abdominal pain and bloating that women with endometriosis can experience, with 60 per cent of patients in the study reporting significant improvements in their gastrointestinal symptoms after adhering to the "Low FODMAP" diet.
- The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> (page 3) reports users of weight-loss drugs such as Ozempic are being
  warned to be alert for the drugs to potentially trigger the painful shingles virus, though the TGA
  has yet to find evidence linking shingles to consumers of Ozempic, Mounjaro and Wegovy.

#### New research links mitchondrial health and female reproductive ageing

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# Kava smuggling to NT Indigenous communities spikes after import controls lifted, leaders say
