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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Canberra Times</u> (page 3) reports that the Joint Committee of Public Accounts and Audit examined Audit Office reports on different agencies, including the Department of Health's regulation of medicines and aged care reforms. The ANAO report found that health regulators tried to use powers that were not legally available to them for audits of aged care providers.
- <u>The Herald Sun</u> (page 1) leads coverage reporting that West Coast Eagles co-captain Oscar Allen has urged people struggling with mental health to seek help, as the team dedicated their win to former player Adam Selwood, who died on Saturday. This added to the call for a mental health round to increase awareness. *Also reported by: The Australian, The Age, West Australian*
- <u>The Advertiser</u> (page 3) reports that a new study from the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute of Medical Research found that just two days of eating fatty, processed food can cause "silent" inflammation and lead to chronic inflammatory diseases. However, eating a diet of "good" fats can strengthen gut protection. *Also reported by: The Daily Telegraph, The Mercury*
- The Daily Telegraph (online) reports that Monash University and Peninsula Health's National Centre for Healthy Ageing has developed an AI tool that can detect dementia by analysing medical records and identifying "clues" beyond cognitive symptoms to improve diagnosis and care.

- <u>NT News</u> (online) reports that NT coroner Elisabeth Armitage will open a five-day inquest into the 2022 death of police officer Michael Deutrom, one of four police suicides within three months that year, which raised concerns about mental health and wellbeing support for officers.
- <u>ABC Online</u> reports that the H5N1 avian flu has spread across Antarctica, affecting flying seabirds, penguins and seals. Experts said the virus is evolving in unexpected ways and warned about increased risk to Australia as more bird species can potentially spread it over longer distances.

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Gestational diabetes soars by 70% in Australia: what's driving the surge?

Gestational diabetes mellitus (GDM) prevalence has surged by almost 70% in five years, putting thousands of women and their babies at risk of future health complications. Of particular concern is the Northern Territory, which has almost tripled its incidence of GDM, while Victoria has doubled its incidence. A Monash University meta-analysis was published in the Australian and New Zealand Journal of Public Health using data from over 1.8 million pregnant women compiled from the National Diabetes Services Scheme (NDSS) and Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS).
